**Course Description:** This course surveys the long history of Chinese Civilization, from the beginnings of agriculture in the Neolithic Period to the upheavals of the modern era. Themes followed throughout the course include state formation, social and cultural history, material and visual culture, and the relationship between law and society. This is a great deal of material to cover in one summer term, but hopefully you will finish this course with a greater appreciation of the unique features of Chinese civilization, and a general knowledge of its historical trajectory.

In other words, if you do not have a passing grade in section, you cannot pass the course, regardless of your grades on the final exam or the essays. Unexcused absence in *two or more* sections will lead to an automatic failure in section.

This online course will be hosted on GauchoSpace. Nearly all course materials, except for the required paper textbook and course reader, will be available on GauchoSpace. Some assignments will require access to other sites.

#### Communication

Email and Zoom video-conferencing will be the primary means of direct communication in this course. If you have a general or specific question, please email the TA's first, then the instructor (<u>abarbieri@history.ucsb.edu</u>) if the TA cannot resolve the issue. Both the instructor and the TA's will also hold "virtual office hours" each week over Zoom. The times and links are listed above. #### **Technology and Tech Support**


This course relies fairly heavily on a number of technologies, including GauchoSpace, GauchoCast, and Zoom, but also 3D models, WEB GL video games, and Flash-based interactions and lectures. Detailed instructions for using these technologies will be included for each relevant assignment, and you may also contact the TA for additional tech support.

#### Workload and Timing of Assignments Each Week

A summer session course is more compressed than a 10-week, quarter-long course, so you should expect the weekly workload to be heavier. The number of pages for readings and the length of recorded lectures are given in the instructions for each unit. Given that your work/internship/volunteer schedule may be irregular, you are allowed to work through the lectures and quizzes ahead of the current week listed on the syllabus, but please be aware that <u>all assignments and quizzes also have a hard deadline</u>. Furthermore, you are required to meet in a group section once per week with your TA. If time-zone differences make this impossible, you may be allowed to watch a video of the recorded discussion section and compose a written discussion response to the issues raised in section. (This has to be arranged with the TA <u>in advance</u>). The final exam will be a take-home essay, and the prompt will be posted by the end of the fourth week.

#### Weekly Road Map

The following chart gives an overview of what a typical week will be like in this course. Each week consists of a section meeting as well as two or three "units," which include a recorded PowerPoint lecture, lecture quizzes, associated textbook readings, primary sources, film documentaries (three total), and often a self-paced, student-directed investigation exercise (with included written response).

# Explorations and Investigations (1 or 2 per week) 25% of total grade (5% each)

These graded exercises are designed to be completed on your own. They allow you to explore an aspect of Chinese civilization, through modern or historical maps, computer simulations of archaeological sites, or famous paintings. Each unit is provided with some guide or instructions, and requires a short write-up afterwards, which will form part of your grade. Though you may complete the exercise at any time during the week's unit, you must submit the assignment by the deadline, before the next week's unit, usually Sunday just before midnight.

- 1) Neolithic Village of Banpo (Web GL model) (may take approx. 45 minutes)
  - a) Explore a portion of the Neolithic village site of Banpo, discovered near modern Xi'an. This is a WEBGL videogame (link in Gauchospace). Complete a matching quiz about features at the site, and write a couple paragraphs interpreting some features at the site, based on this exploration (such as defensive ditches, house foundations, storage pits), and how this relates to the lives of the group of people that occupied the site.
- 2) Wu Family Cemetery Site Exploration of Iconography (QuickTime VR) (may take 1 hour)
  - a) After watching the recorded lecture on modes of Chinese narrative illustration, explore a recreation of the Han period Wu Family Cemetery.
- 3) The Mogao Caves at Dunhuang (HTML5) (may take 1 hour)
  - a) Explore two painted Buddhist caves at the site in virtual reality and compare their decoration and subject matter.
- 4) "The Spring Festival Along the River" Scroll Exploration (FLASH) (may take 2 hours)
  - a) Explore the famous *Qingming Shanghetu* scroll by Zhang Zeduan. Pick one particular region outside or inside the city walls, and describe what the people are doing. Discuss issues of gender, economy, age, class, religion, etc.
- 5) "The Indian Ocean in the 15<sup>th</sup> Century" (HTML5) (may take 1.5-2 hours)

a) Explore this famous long map from the 17<sup>th</sup> century, often called the Mao Kun map, or the Wubeizhi Chart. Using the character glosses and the latitude calculations on the accompanying guide, decipher three place names near the end of the map and answer a quiz on these.

## **Essays and Projects:**

Timeline Blog project (10% of grade)

In this project, the class will collaboratively build a timeline of the important events, people, and periods of Chinese history. This will always be viewable on the "Welcome" tab of the class (i.e. week 0). Each student will be assigned to write **ONE short entry** for the timeline, and assign an associated image or video to that entry. This information will be input into a Google spreadsheet, which is used to generate the timeline. The actual assignment is described, along with video instructions, after the "week 6" tab for the class.
